


A View from the (Arm of the) Chair



Business Report

The CRC's business arrangements are now at the forefront of our activities, with the goal of having the Centre up and running on 1 July. An overview of the progress that we have made on business arrangements and Centre agreements is given below. Although the business of establishing the Cooperative Research Centre for National Plant Biosecurity is necessarily new to us, we are capitalising on the expertise of people who have experience and skills in setting up new CRCs to help us in this task. With the knowledge that there are other newly-funded CRCs encountering the same issues as us, I have met several times with fellow interim CEOs this year and there is agreement between us to share ideas and cooperate in finding solutions to common problems.

Business arrangements

The Department of Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry has agreed to underwrite the costs incurred before the start-up of the CRC, on the basis that these will be recovered from the CRC after establishment. These costs include: lease of premises; legal fees; recruitment costs; meeting costs; travel costs; and CEO salary (after recruitment). The CRC funding offer made by DEST at the end of last year specifically allows for the recovery of startup costs from the funding provided by the Commonwealth. Participants have agreed that the administrative office of the CRC should be colocated with the offices of PHA Ltd in FECCA House, Deakin, ACT. We have managed to secure suitable independent office space in this building and the details of the lease are currently being finalized.

The start-up phase presents a number of administrative challenges to a new CRC, lying as it does in that legal grey area between non-entity and entity. Synova (Science Management Services Pty Ltd), a company based in the Innovation Centre at the Australian National University, offers business services during the start-up phase to CRCs like our own. Synova will act on our behalf until the CRC is established. Given the CRC's present lack of corporate identity, Synova will provide us with an ACN/ABN Number, a registered name and a registered address. This will, for example, allow us to enter into a lease for our premises at Deakin. Synova will also arrange necessary insurances on an interim basis.

Agreements

FAL Lawyers has been approached by Synova to provide advice for our Centre and to draft the documents which will enable CRC National Plant Biosecurity Ltd to commence operations on 1 July, next. FAL is an experienced advisor to a number of CRCs. FAL are producing a Fundamental Issues Document (FID) setting out the key issues on which participants will need to reach agreement. A teleconference will be arranged in approximately 2 weeks after circulation of the FID to discuss our progress. A face-to-face meeting is planned for 19 April to reach final agreement between Participants. The draft Schedules for the Commonwealth Agreement, as populated by DEST, have been circulated. All participants have been requested to provide feedback on the issues that DEST has requested we address.

Search for a CEO

The Interim Board has appointed a Search Committee and the recruitment process for a CEO has commenced. The position has been advertised with a closing date for applications of early April. Consistent with undertakings made in the business case and at interview, the position has been advertised in Australia and overseas. Details from these advertisements have been given below for your reference.

CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER: COOPERATIVE RESEARCH CENTRE FOR NATIONAL PLANT BIOSECURITY

The Cooperative Research Centre (CRC) for National Plant Biosecurity will combine the expertise of scientists, from a wide range of disciplines, who work in federal, state and territory agencies; universities and industry across Australia. The prime objective of the CRC is to pre-empt and diminish the economic and environmental impact of pests on the plant industries. To achieve this objective the CRC will develop and deploy novel technologies and new approaches to biosecurity to the advantage of agribusiness, producers and governments. The incorporated CRC will be a company limited by guarantee with an independent, skills-based board of six, plus the independent Chairman. The Head Office will be located in Canberra . Start up date is 1 July 2005 for an expected seven year term. Current CRC resources, cash and 'in-kind', exceed \$9 million per annum . Additional sources of potential investment are being identified.

The Chief Executive Officer (CEO) manages all aspects of the Centre's business and will be expected to inculcate and maintain the CRC's values of excellence, innovation and independence. A high level of competence in attracting and managing the finances of the CRC will be a key expectation of the CEO. The CEO is responsible to the Board for: providing leadership; building effective links between participants, stakeholders and the Australian community; managing a research portfolio consistent with the CRC's Strategic Plan; monitoring progress and achievement of outputs against performance indicators in the Strategic Plan; promoting the adoption of CRC outputs; promoting the education and training programs of the CRC; gaining recognition of the outputs and outcomes, including capacity building, from CRC activities; and managing the resources of the CRC in accordance with Board directions.

An attractive remuneration package will be negotiated with the successful applicant.






